#### NOTES.

It will be observed that the period covered by the foregoing Part is only fifteen years. The increasing activity of the Cork presses as the eighteenth century drew to its close is very striking and interesting, and the greater variety of their output is very noticeable. These features will be more apparent in the succeeding parts into which the last decade will have to be divided, and are positive evidence that the circle of authors and readers in Cork must have been of a very respectable size.

I am indebted for the same kind help in this part to the same contributors as previously.

There are four broadsides without place, date, or printer, bound up at the end of a volume of pamphlets in the National Library, vol. 161. A manuscript note states they were published in Cork, and hawked about the streets there; so, probably, they were also printed there. They are directed against "Sir John Colthurst." The writer of the manuscript note states he knew who was the author of first three broadsides, and gives several explanations of references in them. The period is between Christmas, 1786, and February, 1787.

### Doneraile and Vicinity.

HREE hundred and two years have now passed since Edmund Spenser died in his lodgings at King Street, Westminster, on January 16th, 1599. We think that a short sketch of his history and that of his descendants may not be unacceptable to our readers; but, first of all, we shall begin with the earlier history of that castle which has become

so inseparably connected with the name and fame of the poet. The good St. Colman, a disciple and companion of St. Finbar, was poet-royal or poet-laureate in the year 550 A.D., and in this capacity was present at the inauguration of Aodh Caomh, King of Cashel. St. Colman died 24th November, 604. It is stated on good authority that he founded a small church at Kilcolman in 555 A.D., and that a second church was also erected for him by Eochaidh, King of Ireland, at Cloyne in A.D. 560. St. Finbar, a son of Amergin, of the O'Brien race, St. Colman, and St. Molaga, who founded the monastery of Timoleague and the church at Laurentinum, are very closely connected in respect of time and place. Canon O'Hanlon tells us that as St. Cummin Fota was passing near Cloghliamoney, in the barony of Fermoy, he saw an aged couple sowing flaxseed; he enquired had they any issue or not. They made answer that they were childless. The saint predicted that they would have a son, who was born in seven months from that date. This son was St. Molaga, who founded, in the seventh century, the church of Eidham Molaga, near Marshalstown, the church of Aha Cross, and died at Labba Molaga. Timoleague Abbey was also built by St. Molaga. St. Ruadhan, who cursed Tara on account of the edict made by the King, Dermott, to make all the doors in the kingdom wider, dwelt for some time at Cloyne with St. Finbar in the earlier years of the sixth century.
