#### PART IX.—FINAL LIST.

This final instalment contains a full collation of certain items of Cork printing only briefly mentioned in the preceding parts of this List, in consequence of there being no copy available for reference at the time, but which have since been found and examined. In some instances additional references to other copies merely are given. It is desirable—necessary in fact—to place such references on record as they undoubtedly widen the sphere of utility of the list. There may be persons interested in a particular book or pamphlet living at a distance from such libraries as those of Dublin, Cork, or Belfast, who may be glad to learn of the existence of a copy of it in some English or private library. I have also the pleasure of adding fourteen entirely new titles, which have come under my notice within the last few months. Lastly, there will be found, briefly stated, what Cork newspapers are now preserved in Trinity College Library and the National Library, Dublin.

As sources of information, our provincial newspapers are daily becoming more realized and valued; but unfortunately so great has been the neglect to file copies of the local newspapers, and so little value has been attached to them in the past, that it is often difficult, if not impossible, to come across even a single number of some of these papers, and almost hopeless to find complete sets of any. Unless strong and immediate efforts be made to remedy this neglect by collecting all available copies or volumes into our libraries here, it will soon be too late to do so. It is, however, a pleasure to know that the National Library Trustees and the librarian (Mr. Lyster) are now steadily endeavouring to make the acquisition of such provincial newspapers, as well as those of the Metropolis, a leading feature of their important library; and it is to be hoped that by donations as well as by purchase they will, as each year goes by, add materially to their number.

I desire, in conclusion, once more to sincerely thank all who kindly helped me in compiling this List, and more particularly Mr. James Coleman, whose original compilation formed the foundation of it, and Mr. James Buckley who added much to it and helped me in other ways.

## Dr. Caulfield's Contributions to the "Gentleman's Magazine." (Continued from page 198.)

To the number of this magazine for February, 1863, Dr. Caulfield contributed "Some Early Charters Relating to Kinsale," which he stated were the only series in existence concerning Kinsale, except the papers of the Browne family, which embrace the Charter of Lord Barry, the feudal superior of Kinalea, from which he had made copious extracts. He adds, that he had ascertained that the Enrolments in Chancery are quite destitute of information relative to Kinsale. Dr. Caulfield had at this time probably little idea of bringing out his "Council Book of the Corporation of Kinsale," which he published in 1879. The twenty-one items in the above contribution are all in Latin. In a footnote he refers to Tracton Abbey, respecting which he draws on Dr. Smith's "History of Cork." The Cogans, he adds, obtained after the Conquest a grant of the entire barony of Kinalea and Kerricurrihy, in which Tracton Abbey (now entirely demolished) was situated. In old MSS, this district is called Longa Gowganig, which signifies Cogan's ship. Now united into one, these baronies formerly comprehended the barony of Imokilly, in which the Carews settled after the English Conquest.
